
"We established the class with two very specific learning objectives," said Tom Pearce, president of iLead Consulting & Training and program facilitator. "Our first objective was to sharpen the leadership skills of the participants. The second was to provide networking opportunities for these talented leaders."

We built some fun features into the design of the program," said Pearce. "For instance, during the program we gave each participant '15 Minutes of Fame' - their chance to stand up and describe their organization to the group. We made the program as interactive as we possibly could, asking the group to present and solve problems, and work collaboratively as much as possible. Special pains were taken to ensure that program content did not overlap with the Citizenship McKinney class --- just in case people wanted to attend both programs.

"Perhaps the most interesting feature of the program," according to Ray Coleman of Tapestry Healthcare, "was the chance to visit the various nonprofit agencies represented in the class. We went all the way from MCDC offices and the Chamber to Stonebridge United Methodist Church, and then from The Red Cross to the YMCA. The range of experiences and the variety of issues my fellow leaders are facing is fascinating," said Coleman.

"I looked forward to class every Friday morning," said Lori Villarreal, director of programs for the McKinney Family YMCA. "The class was fast-paced and relevant. All of us walked out of the program with new ideas and new perspectives each week.'

"I felt like I was back in college," said Cammy Henderson of the McKinney Chamber of Commerce. "Only we were much more participative and interactive as we learned about leadership. This program provided me with lots of interesting new material and valuable contacts around town — the spirited discussions on fund raising, board development, and volunteer recruitment were outstanding."
