"I think it's pretty neat," said Vanessa Shackleford of McKinney, who was seated in the waiting room. The cheery image also

delights her grandchildren.

Mr. Coleman said the wall is a

work in progress.

The CEO said he's eager to add more donors to the wall, named for his deceased parents, Cora A. and Ray Coleman, especially since the clinic that opened in February 2004 is scrambling to replace a \$150,000 state grant that just ran out.

Tapestry serves uninsured and low-income folks on a sliding scale. It's also a Medicare, Medicaid and Children's Health Insurance Program provider.

One of a handful of nonprofit clinics in Collin County, it is seeing an escalating demand for services.


